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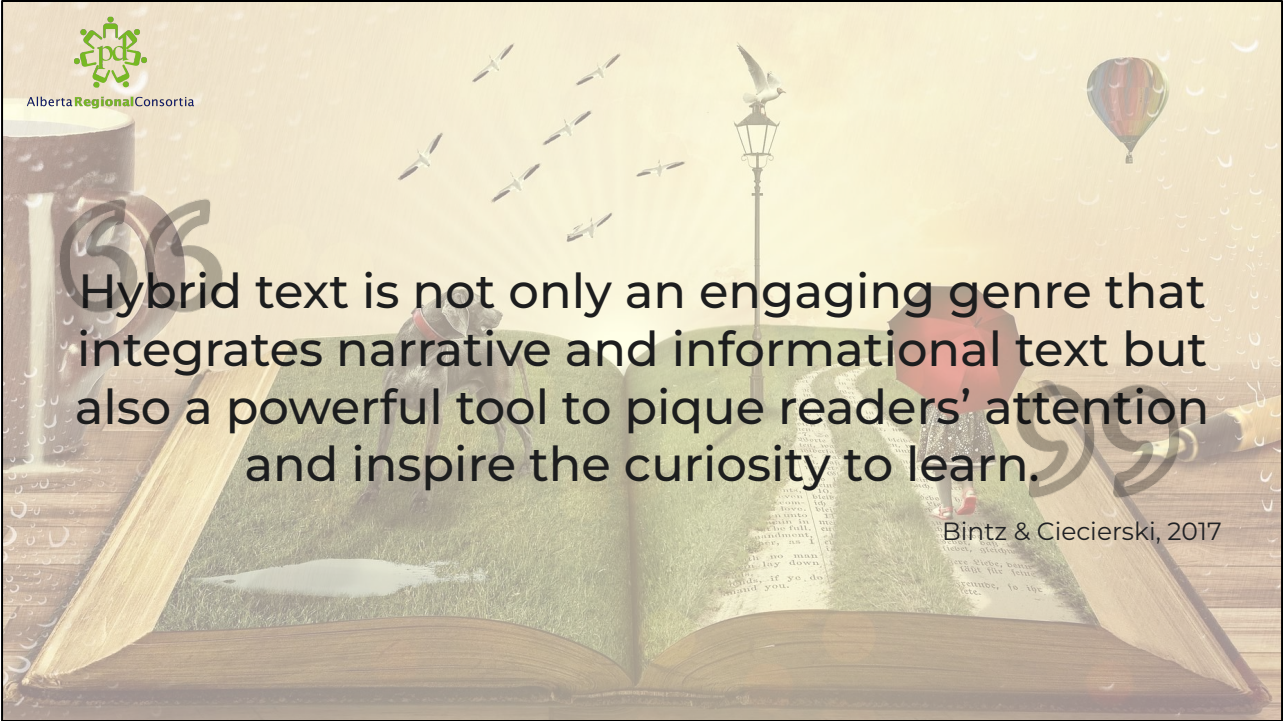

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Introducing Your Students to Hybrid Texts

- ☐ Gather a selection of hybrid texts. (See below.)
- ☐ Invite students to explore these texts in small groups.
 - ☐ Ask them to consider:
 - ☐ What do you notice?
 - ☐ What do you wonder?
 - ☐ Encourage students to use sticky notes to label their observations about this type of text.
- ☐ As a class, bring together the observations to compile a list of the characteristics of this type of text.
 - ☐ Provide several more samples. Ask students if this fits the criteria of a hybrid text. How do they know?
- ☐ Invite students to reflect on why an author might choose this form of writing.



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Writing Hybrid Texts

Create from Given Non-Fiction Excerpt

- ❑ Offer students a selection non-fiction texts (ie. paragraphs from a textbook or similar resource) and ask them to transform it into a hybrid text through the addition of narrative/story or poetry.


Spend time with students exploring the connections between the fiction elements of the hybrid text and the non-fiction. What is the author doing that connects the two texts? How can we use these moves in our own writing? It might be easiest to focus this assignment to using the non-fiction text to create poetry. This would connect to mini-lessons on figurative language and forms of poetry. Add expectations to use of figurative language or poetic form to the Guide to Success (if applicable).

Apply creative thinking processes through experimenting with, evaluating, and selecting details to produce a desired effect.

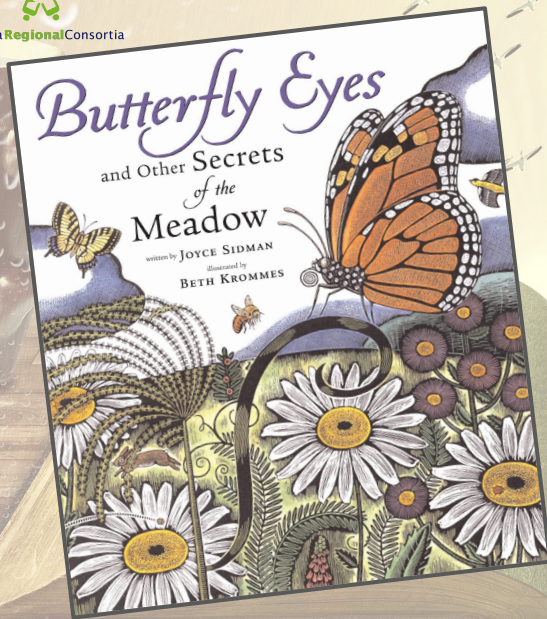

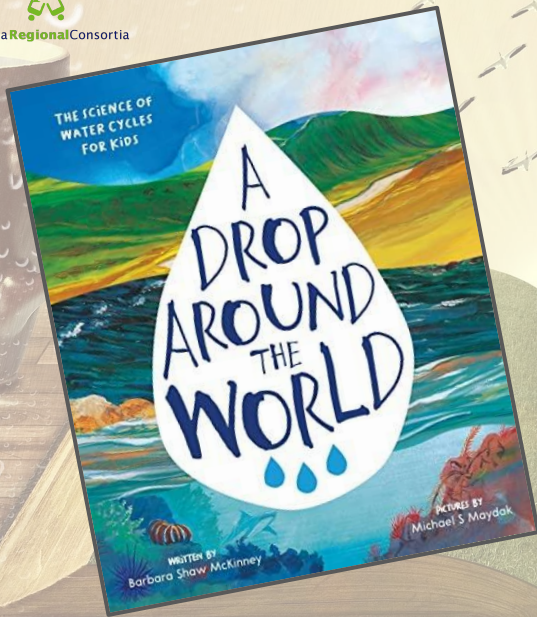

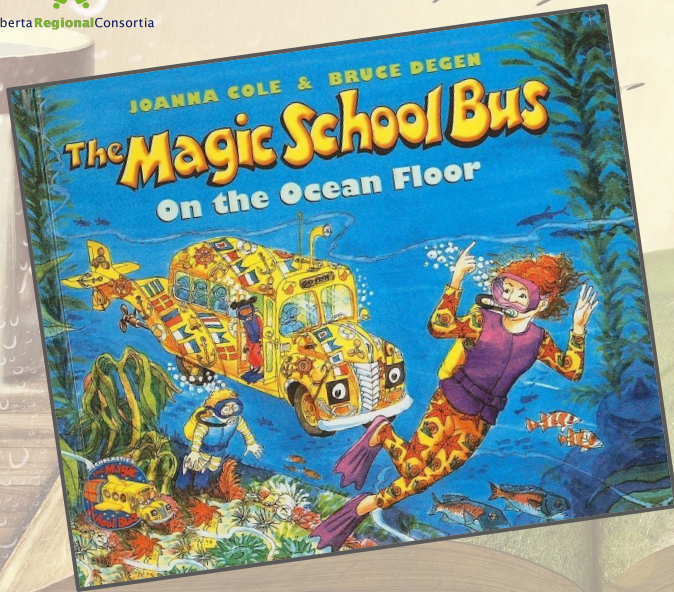

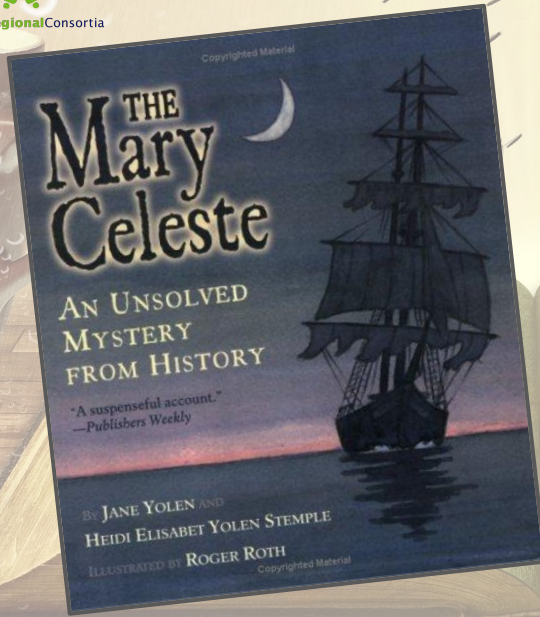
The universe narrates a story about evolution on Earth (fiction) and it's layered with informational text, as well as a running timeline along the top of the page (nonfiction).

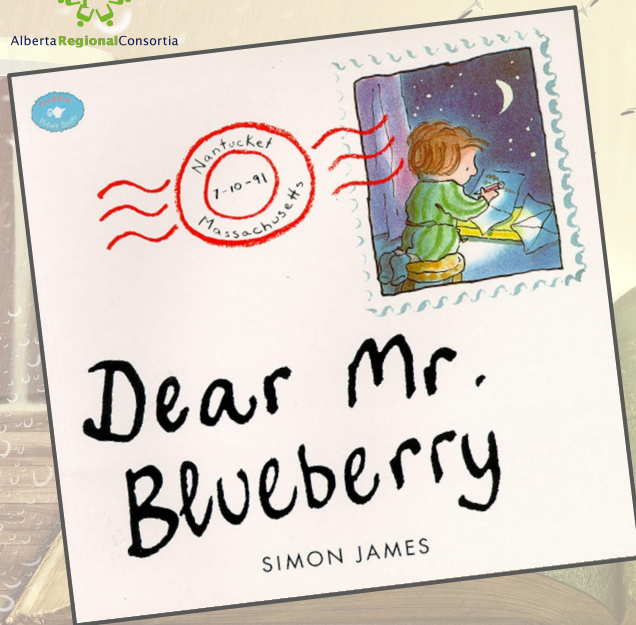

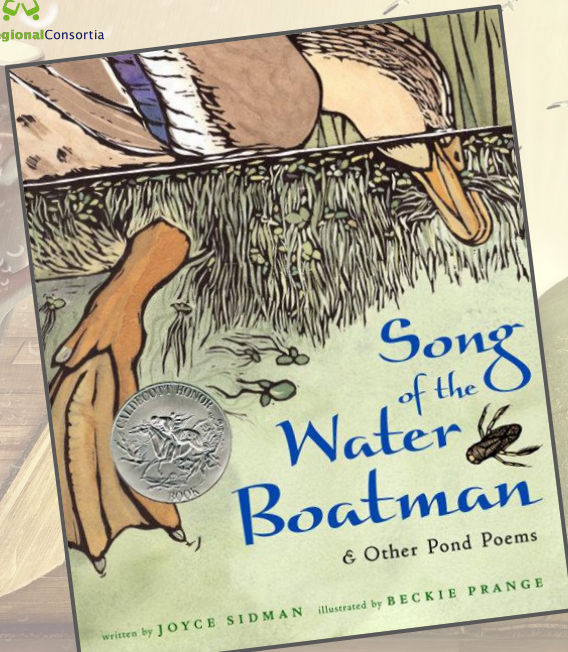
