



One-Point Rubric (Single Point Rubric)

ONE

Rubrics are charts that provide expectations and the opportunity for teacher feedback or student self assessment. A one-point (single point) rubric includes the descriptor for the knowledge and skills that students are expected to demonstrate at the proficient level, as well as providing space for the teacher or student to give descriptive feedback on the strengths and areas for growth demonstrated in evidence of learning. Evidence of learning can include conversations, products or observations. "The single point rubric provides a single set of criteria for quality work" (Fluckinger, J. 2010).
