- Choose one and write the memory bit-by-bit.



Personal Narrative - Important Place


- Think of a place that matters to you.

Narrative - Fiction - What If...


- 1. Think of something true and real from your life.

- Create chart with students


Information - Personal Expertise

- Have students find topics that they already know a lot about
- List possible chapters/subtopics
- Begin writing each chapter/subtopic
- · Determine where more information is needed
- Teach how to find information




Persuasive Writing

Persuasive - Dig for & Uncover Topics




