




Have you ever thought about what history is? What does the word actually mean? Dictionary.com defines history as follows:

HISTORY: a continuous, systematic narrative of past events as relating to a particular people, country, period, person, etc., usually written as a chronological account.

The definition uses the term narrative. A narrative is a story or account of events.

Take a look at the following diagram and discuss the follow-up questions:




Answer the following questions and discuss your answers:


FOLLOW UP
